

Once a hub for railroads, ranchers and miners, Salida's economic driver today is tourism. Thousands of visitors each year soak up the area's hot springs, whitewater rafting, mountain climbing, snow skiing and RV'ing adventures. They also seek out the arts and culture of Salida's National Historic District and certified Creative District filled with art galleries, fine dining, local libations, specialty boutiques and more. Festivals throughout the spring, summer and fall also attract lovers of wine, beer, arts and music.

As the county seat, Salida is the hub of local government and social services. It is home base to Heart of the Rockies Regional Medical Center and an educational system that links high school students and adults to Colorado Mountain College.

Many consider Salida to be the crossroads of central Colorado, where the Continental Divide is only 25 miles away, and where North and South diverge to create the "Banana Belt" of the Arkansas River Valley.

Transportation

Salida could be considered the crossroads of Central Colorado, where two of Colorado's major highway corridors intersect. U.S. Highway 50 is a major east-west route, and Highway 285 is a major north-south route. Both highways connect to the interstate highway system.

Denver is a 2.5-hour drive from Salida, and Colorado Springs is a 2-hour drive. Salida has the geographic advantage of being located on the Rocky Mountain's eastern slope, making access to the Front Range much easier in winter than having to cross the Continental Divide.

Arts/Creative District/Music 🛕

In 2012, Colorado's governor designated Salida as a certified Creative District for its dozens of artist-owned studios and galleries, restaurants, specialty boutiques, coffee shops, breweries and distilleries. Architectural gems from the early 20th century comprise Salida's downtown Historic District. These original buildings that once housed lumber companies and saloons have become home to fine dining establishments, a boutique hotel, toy stores, art galleries, coffee shops, spas and retail shopping.

Salida owes its vibrancy as an artsy tourist destination to a small community of artists who settled here in the 1990s following the decline of the railroad and mining industries. As the economic downturn drove away retailers, artists transformed empty storefronts into spacious art studios and galleries. Art lovers will find endless styles of painting, sculpture, pottery, wearable art, photography, jewelry, metal works and wood works in downtown Salida and beyond.

Music is another important aspect of Salida's culture. Live music is part of daily life throughout Salida's restaurants, bars, outdoor patios, parks and even sidewalk benches. In downtown Salida, Riverside Park is the perfect venue for music and arts festivals all summer long and the SteamPlant Event Center presents concerts, films, theater and other entertainers year-round.

Recreation A

For outdoor enthusiasts, Salida is a dream come true. The Arkansas River flows through downtown Salida giving anglers direct access to the 102 miles of Gold Medal Waters where trophy-size trout thrive.

Nearly 80 percent of Chaffee County is comprised of public lands that provide countless trails and 14,000-foot mountains to explore and conquer. It's a paradise for hiking, biking and off-roading, and also offers quiet solitude for RV'ing and camping. We also have ziplining, dog sledding, horseback riding, rock-hounding, mountain biking, historic walking tours and even a Salida Circus.

Salida's FIBArk festival (First in Boating on the Arkansas) began June 19, 1949, when six boats raced down the Arkansas River from Salida to Cañon City. Each June, FIBArk attracts thousands of whitewater competitors and spectators to the popular boat races, and a long weekend of celebrating includes live music, foot and bicycle races, a carnival and specialty foods and libations.

In winter, nearby Monarch Mountain ski resort offers 100-percent, all-natural snow for snow skiing and tubing only 25 minutes from Salida.

Staying active is easy in town, too, with 6 public parks and playgrounds, Loyal Duke Dog Park, Salida Golf Club, Salida Hot Springs Aquatic Center, miniature golf, climbing gym, a bowling center, gyms, fitness and yoga studios, and numerous classes and sports leagues for youth and adults, ranging from soccer to pickleball.

History A

For thousands of years, this Rocky Mountain region was the Ute Indians' hunting grounds and summer residence. Spanish explorers came in the 1400s, and on Christmas Eve 1806, Zebulon M. Pike, of Pike's Peak fame, recorded that his starving expedition was thankful to discover bison while camping just north of Salida.

Everything changed after the Colorado Gold Rush of 1859. Gold rushes and boom towns exploded across Colorado and the Utes were removed to reservations in the 1870s. Stagecoach stops at Cleora (just east of Salida) and present-day Poncha Springs were on the route to the gold camps, and ranches sprang up to sell beef to miners and railroad workers.

In May 1880 the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad's narrow-gauge rails reached Salida. The tent city soon gave way to sturdy wooden saloons, hotels, restaurants, mercantile shops and homes. When fires in 1886 and 1888 destroyed downtown, city officials required new construction to be built of brick. That decision ultimately preserved 111 turn-of-the-century buildings that now comprise Salida's Downtown Historic District. Many people worldwide came to Colorado to seek their fortunes. Salida became Sister Cities with Lago, Italy, in 2014 to celebrate the many Lago immigrants who contributed significantly to the local culture.

As highway travel became increasingly popular after World War II, Salida's rail employee numbers dropped from 500 to 50. Local mine closures brought more economic decline in the 1980s and '90s.

The economic downturn might have been the catalyst that invigorated Salida in the 1990s as artists began moving into the affordable, downtown storefronts and setting up art studios and galleries.

Artists, property owners and preservationists worked with the city to rebrand Salida as a thriving cultural center and regional arts destination. They transformed downtown into a family-friendly area with a whitewater park, visitor parking, public restrooms and Riverside Park, a popular venue for outdoor music, festivals and events.

Outdoor recreation continues to thrill locals and visitors who come here to fish, climb Fourteeners and snow ski. And FIBArk (First In Boating on the Arkansas), which began in 1949, attracts thousands of spectators and competitors to the annual whitewater races.

Several old buildings have been repurposed into hubs of activity. The 1885 railroad hospital, now the Touber Building, houses City Hall. And the steam-powered electric plant built in 1892 is now the SteamPlant Event Center, an anchor for the arts community and Salida's Creative District. Its WiFi and high-tech amenities accommodate business conferences and workshops as well as concerts, films and art exhibits.

Salida's relaxed zoning for the Central Business District permits a large variety of uses for existing structures. For example, a boutique shop might be located below a residential dwelling and adjacent to a restaurant. This variety of uses helps

maintain vitality with a mix of residential, retail, office and entertainment coexisting as neighbors.
